Prior to the community meeting, a few of our first graders visited the pantry to determine what specific items were needed and shared this information with students and staff during the meeting. We are so pleased by the response from our students and families and are prepared to deliver a number of items to the food pantry next week. It is worth noting that some of our first grade classrooms will also help to stock the shelves with the items that were donated.

In related news, Mrs. Bastiani from Fresh Start Gardens will work with Mrs. Mannone's first grade students to harvest the lettuce we have been growing in our gardens at Robinson. This lettuce will accompany the other

donations to the food pantry. Earlier in the month, Mrs. Bastiani also worked with students to harvest herbs and greens that were used in our kitchen.

This week second graders were thrilled to visit the school store for the first time during the 2017-2018 school year. I witnessed careful decision-making by students as to which items to purchase. Several of the children donated their change to our compassion corner as they left the store. Students in Pre-1st and First grade will have a chance to visit the school store on Tuesday, October 24th.

On Tuesday, October 10th the PK-5 teachers met at Stony Brook Middle School in the morning to learn about professional learning communities from John Vander Els. In the afternoon, teachers returned to their buildings to meet as small group collaborative teams. Teams have chosen a topic within a curriculum area to focus on to improve the learning experiences for students. Future professional development sessions will maintain a focus on collaborative teaming to explore specific topics. John Vander El will meet with the elementary group again on January 16th.

PTO: Academic Enrichment Programs

The PTO continues to sponsor several exciting programs for our students! On Friday, September 29th, our kindergarten classes were treated to a special presentation from Rhythm Kids. Students had the opportunity to do some drumming of their own and were taken on a "plane ride" using the sound of instruments to do so.

This week first graders will meet with author/illustrator Emilie Boon who has published 20 books. Students will learn about the process of becoming an author and illustrator and will be given the opportunity to try illustrating a short story with guidance from Ms. Boon.

Kindness Bulletin Board

Mr. Middlemiss and I are in complete awe of the kind acts that students have demonstrated since we first challenged them a few weeks ago. The bulletin board that we created is now filled with examples of kind acts that students performed.

Car Pick-Up and Drop Off

Drop Off: As we approach November we kindly request that all students exit the vehicle **independently** and from the **passenger door** closest to the curb. We believe it is safest for students to exit this way so that they do not need to cross in front or back of the car. You may also choose to park and walk your child into school if they are unable to exit the car independently. Thank you for your assistance with this.

Pick-Up: Please remember to have your placard visible for adults to see. Though I have come to memorize vehicles and parents, etc. there are times that other staff members unfamiliar with vehicles fill in for me. To ensure a safe and efficient process we ask that you have this ready each day.

Parent-Teacher Conferences and Report Cards

Parent-Teacher Conferences are scheduled for November 20th and 21st. In the next two weeks you will receive additional information in your child's backpack regarding the conference schedule along with directions for using our online conference sign-up.

Last year some minor adjustments were made to the elementary report card schedule. We have extended the length of the first marking term by approximately 4 weeks. Historically, the first marking term has been the shortest of the three terms each year. The beginning of the school year is a time when teachers are getting to know their students, establishing routines, and laying the groundwork for a positive classroom culture. The increase in time to the first marking term will provide teachers with a greater opportunity to assess each student's strengths. With this term 1 adjustment, the number of days in each marking term is more equitable and students will have more instructional time in the first term to meet the term 1 benchmarks.
