
Tribute JEFF HAIGHT


From 1984 to 1999 the WA Girls' Varsity Soccer team greatly benefited from Coach Jeff Haight's active involvement. During his 16 seasons as varsity girls' soccer coach his overall record was 182-76-46....now that's getting results! Three seasons his teams won DCL or Wachusett League championships. His 1999 team won the North Division II district title. In 1985 and 1998 he was selected the Lowell Sun Girls' Soccer Coach of the Year. The Boston Globe named Jeff the Division II Girls' Soccer Coach of the Year in 1999. Of the 16 years he coached the varsity his teams qualified for post tournament play 15 times. As if he hadn't already contributed enough to the girls' soccer program, Jeff served as a coaching volunteer from 2001-2016. Jeff's knowledge of the sport, field awareness, time management skills, and goalkeeping training expertise were invaluable. In 2012 his 1999 Varsity Girls' soccer team was inducted into the WAAHoF.

Jeff arrived on the girls' soccer coaching scene two years after the inception of the program. Moving forward Jeff should be referred to as the "father" of WA Girls' Soccer. As a coach he exemplified passion for the sport, led by example, displayed commitment, as well as dedication to the coaching profession. He demonstrated a burning desire to win, while simultaneously revealing patience with his players. Jeff had a knack for being "tuned in" with each of his players, both on and off the soccer pitch. His timing with the use of humor kept his players' interscholastic experience "real". Jeff coached with genuine sportsmanship and the highest character, while exhibiting high expectations. In October 2018 Jeff was inducted into the WAAHoF for his commitment and excellence as a superior soccer coach.

A dedicated and resourceful member of the WAAHoF Executive Board from 2012-2019, he was an asset to the organization, continually suggesting workable ideas on how to enhance the WAAHoF Walk of Fame displays, while performing much of the work himself. This talented individual created displays of photos for the WA Wall of Fame trophy case, and others for the WA Holiday Bazaar and induction ceremonies that depicted his unparalleled craftsmanship.

After waging a valiant and lengthy battle against cancer, Jeff passed away in August 2019. Jeff's "can do, will do" attitude is missed in every venue where he was involved. On behalf of the WAAHoF Executive Board, WA Athletic Department, and the Westford community, we dedicate tonight's induction program in Jeff's memory as a highly effective, and selfless coach, teacher and volunteer.





Tribute TOM SMITH

In his tenure from 1967-2002, Tom ("T") Smith had a remarkable impact and legacy on everything he touched at WA. From coaching both football and basketball, to his role as Athletic Director, to the positive impact he had as a WA business teacher, Tom did it all.

Tom began both his teaching and coaching careers in 1967 at WA, serving as the freshman football coach. In 1968 he was called into the Army and spent 14 months in Vietnam in a Reconnaissance Company. He was honorably discharged in 1970 with the rank of Sergeant. He returned to WA as a teacher and started coaching football (line coach) from 1973-1983. From 1971-1977 he was the assistant basketball coach, before becoming varsity basketball coach from 1977-1986. As both a football and basketball coach, he was respected by players and coaches alike from the Westford school community, as well as opposing teams and coaches.

Tom went on to serve as WA's Athletic Director from 1980-1984, while in the midst of cutbacks by Proposition 2 ½. Despite significant budget reductions, Tom was the force behind the creation of several sub-varsity sports, the installment of lights on the football field, and played a role in the establishment of boys' ice hockey as a varsity program.

In addition to his formal roles, Tom was an unofficial mentor to teachers and coaches, always willing to take the time necessary to answer their many questions and concerns. As one coach remarked, "T was such a positive person. He made me a better coach every time I went and talked to him. Any success I had was because of his support and encouragement."

Tom "retired" as the Athletic Director in order to spend more time with his family but still attended most WA sporting events. It was not uncommon to see him at several events during a weekend, always supporting and encouraging WA athletics.



After Tom's passing in 2020, it didn't take long for teachers, students, former athletes, and coaches, to honor him with a permanent scholarship recognizing his commitment to education, especially those students who went the extra mile and didn't always have the easy route; character and commitment before grade point average.

Tom is survived by his wife, Eleanor, and his two daughters, Kathy Smith and Leah Pikora, his son-in-law Dan, and his two favorite grandchildren, Jack and Alli. He will be remembered for his big heart, a positive influence on so many levels at WA, and the indelible mark he left on his students.





WESTFORD ACADEMY GREY GHOSTS 2003 DIVISION II NORTH AND EASTERN MASSACHUSETTS CHAMPIONS 19 - 5

2003 WESTFORD ACADEMY BASEBALL TEAM

Which Westford Academy baseball team is the best of all-time? The 2003 baseball team makes a very legitimate case to claim these bragging rights!

The Grey Ghosts were led by first-year skipper, Coach Peter Arthur (later named Lowell Sun Baseball Coach of the Year). The WA baseball squad had a 5-15 record the previous season. Many questioned how successful this team would be during the 2003 season. With a record of 19-5, they won 15 straight games entering the state final championship game. These diamond wizards were 2003 Dual County League (DCL) champions, 2003 Division II North Sectional champions, 2003 Division II Eastern Massachusetts champions and a 2003 Massachusetts Division II finalist. They are the only baseball team in WA history to play in a state finals game.

On 12/25/03 Andy Nesbitt, reporter for the Boston Globe newspaper, identifying the most improbable team accomplishment in the region during the spring 2003, wrote, "Eight games into the season the Westford Academy baseball team, with its 4-4 record, showed no signs of contending for a championship. But what happened after a freak play in the ninth game, when Eric Smolin tagged up from third on a popup to shortstop to score the winning run in the bottom of the 11th inning, was something nobody saw coming. The Grey Ghosts ripped off fifteen straight wins, and behind the pitching of Rob Hennessy, Smolin, and Steve Burndrett they advanced all the way to the Division 2 state championship game. Although Westford lost to Athol in the title game, 1-0 in extra innings, the run the Grey Ghosts went on to close their season was easily the most impressive effort of the spring."

Referencing the Division II state final baseball game, Lowell Sun reporter Rick Harrison wrote, "The game had everything except timely hitting. There was outstanding pitching, spectacular defense and remarkable performance under extreme pressure." Many attending the state finals contest confidently shared that it was the best baseball game, at any level of competition, they had observed.

Pitcher Rob Hennessey had a 6-1 record with an ERA of 0.24 (two earned runs in 59 innings). In the state final in nine innings Rob allowed five hits and zero earned runs. Rob Hennessey, Eric Smolin, Steve Burndrett, and Ryan Thompson were each named DCL All-Stars. During this thrilling season the team brought endless excitement to Westford Academy and the Westford community!

BOB CARPENTER BOYS' ICE HOCKEY COACH 1997 TO PRESENT

Bob "Coach Carp" Carpenter was a beloved educator within Westford Public Schools for 28 years; all the while serving as boys' Varsity Ice Hockey Coach. His playing days began at Woburn High School, before transitioning to the UMASS Lowell where he served as a two-year captain. Developing such a strong love of the game, Coach Carp decided to commence his coaching career in 1972 at both the high school and collegiate level. Since that time, he has been named Hockey Coach of the Year, inducted into the Massachusetts State Hockey Coaches Hall of Fame, as well as served as the president of the Massachusetts High School Hockey Coaches Association. Now, he is about to enter his 46th year of coaching for the 2022-2023 winter season.

Coach Carp took over leadership of the WA program in 1997. At that point the Ghosts were a Division Three program with only 18 players. Within two years, he took his team to the Division III North finals. He had high expectations for his players and the program, making the leap to Division II in 2001. With just two short years playing in Division II, the team captured the Merrimack Valley Conference/Dual County League (MVC/DCL) championship in 2003. His dedication and drive to compete at the highest possible level prompted the team's final move in 2004 to Division I. In 2005, the Westford Academy hockey team captured their first MVC/DCL Division I League Championship. Coach Carp has since led many teams deep into the Division I and II tournaments, with the most notable run in 2008. The Ghosts went 16-4 in the regular season and lost a Super 8 play-in game in a shootout. They went on to win the Division I North title and competed for the Division I State Championship game at the Boston Garden.

Despite the hundreds of wins Coach Carp has amassed in his career, he's never been one to care about records or statistics. His focus has always been simple: to get the best out of his players and prepare them to compete at the highest possible level. He cultivated on-ice success, but more importantly he instilled a strong work ethic, coaching his players to be respectful, resilient, and ultimately to be better men. Every year, former players flock back to alumni games and the charity golf tournament, a testament to the dynamic tradition and community that Coach Carp has built, which is WA Ice Hockey.

TREY CASSIDY CLASS OF 1986- CROSS COUNTRY AND TRACK & FIELD

While running for Coaches Pawlak, Maguire and Morris, Trey Cassidy was an incredibly accomplished four-year varsity member of both the cross country and track & field teams, captaining both squads during his junior and senior campaigns. While a senior member of the cross country team he established a school record, as well as setting four course records at various Wachusett League running venues. Trey actually qualified for the All-State Cross Country championship three times, also finishing 55th and 22nd. His top career performance resulted in a 21st place finish at the All-State Cross Country Championship in 1985. During his four seasons of competition there was only one class in cross country. In his senior season of cross country the team was Wachusett League champions. With a third-place finish at the Central Massachusetts race his cross-country team earned the first Westford Academy qualification to the state championship meet. The other four members of this talented team were Barry Garside, Frank Minosh, Tom Spicer and Brian Nicholson.

On the track & field team he established school records in the one mile (4:26) and two-mile (9:21); the two-mile time still serves as a Westford Academy record! In 1986 he placed fourth at the All-State Track & Field Championship two-mile race. Perhaps his greatest achievement was placing third at the New England Track & Field Championship meet in the two-mile contest. Trey was a team Most Valuable Player multiple times and Lowell Sun All-Star. Other noteworthy recognitions Trey garnered included: Scholar-Athlete Award winner, National Honor Society member and Class of 1986 Secretary.

After graduation from Westford Academy, Trey ran cross country and track at the University of Pennsylvania. He earned an undergraduate degree in History and a Master's Degree in Education before embarking on a career teaching and assuming a leadership role in independent schools. Trey coached cross country and track at Glenelg Country School in Maryland and at the University Liggett School in Michigan. He continued his competitive athletic pursuits after college, shifting attention toward multi-sport racing (triathlon, duathlon, and team adventure racing). Throughout the last 25 years, Trey competed at the National Championships in duathlon and triathlon, plus the World Championships in duathlon. Currently Trey serves as the Head of School (taking a sabbatical during 2022-2023 academic year) at the Bancroft School, a preK-12 co-ed day school in Worcester, MA. He resides in Holden, MA with his wife and two daughters, both of whom run cross country.

BOB CONLEY


It's fitting Bob Conley is being inducted into the WA Athletic Hall of Fame (WAAHOF); after all, the Athletic Hall of Fame was his idea.

At the 2000 Fall Sports Night meeting, as Director of Athletics, Bob pitched the idea of starting an Athletic Hall of Fame and encouraged attendees to volunteer for this purpose. When Kevin Regan agreed to chair, Bob's idea became a reality.

Bringing good ideas to life was the hallmark of Bob's duration as Director of Athletics. The first full-time Director of Athletics, Bob implemented a variety of programs and systems to bring the WA athletic programs into the 21st century, including the WA Athletic Handbook, WA Athletic website, financial management and record keeping systems, purchasing and materials system, uniform replacement program, as well as the coach evaluation and review program. Bob's particular attention to detail enabled the rapidly expanding athletic program to run like a well-oiled machine. Not only did Bob oversee the WA interscholastic programs, he also managed the programs at the Blanchard and Stony Brook Middle Schools. If you needed to find Bob in the afternoons, you just had to listen for the sound of the Gator; Bob put thousands of miles on it to make sure things were running smoothly.

Bob was also responsible for increasing participation in a variety of sports. As part of his superb 12-year tenure he was instrumental in adding four new varsity programs: girls' ice hockey, boys' and girls' lacrosse, and cheerleading. In addition, he expanded existing programs with either Junior Varsity B or freshman teams in baseball, basketball, field hockey, lacrosse, soccer, softball, volleyball, and boys' ice hockey.

With increased enrollment and engagement in athletics, there was an increased need for locations to play. Bob oversaw the expansion of both the indoor and outdoor facilities at WA and spearheaded the construction of the Coughlin Building to house athletic equipment for outdoor sports and concessions at the WA Trustees Field.



Bob was also a fierce advocate for girls' sports, adding the previously mentioned girls' teams, making sure there was a solid representation of female coaches, and initiating representation at the MIAA Girls and Women in Sports summit annually.

Bob Conley deserves to be recognized as both a "Founding Father" and one of the greatest contributors to the WA interscholastic programs. His actions as Director of Athletics affected countless student-athletes, coaches, and members of the WA community.

MATT ELLIS CLASS OF 2012- BASKETBALL

Matt Ellis started as varsity point guard his freshman year and never looked back. His athletic ability, self-confidence, work ethic, and commitment led him to become one of the most respected players in the DCL and beyond. Matt was a deadly three-point shooter, terrific ball handler, and one of the league's toughest perimeter defenders. As a four-year starter and two-year captain, Matt was a member of a DCL Championship team and also a two-time Greater Lowell Holiday champion. He was recognized as team Most Valuable Player, DCL and Lowell Sun All-Star for three straight years (sophomore through senior), and in his senior year was selected a Boston Herald All-Scholastic. Matt accomplished all of this with style and class, yet was one of the most intense competitors on the court. Don't give Matt any advantage on the court, or you will regret it, as many opposing players learned the hard way.

Matt had the ability to make everyone he played with better, was a leader on and off the basketball court, and was an outstanding role model for younger players throughout Westford. Matt always played the game the "right way." Opposing coaches consistently expressed their support and admiration for Matt, even after their team lost. Matt simply earned everyone's respect.

Statistically, Matt had impressive numbers. He still holds the school record in 3-point attempts, 3-pointers made, and assists. He is fifth all-time in 3-point percentage and also the third all-time leading scorer in program history with 1,070 points. In his four-year varsity career, Matt guided his teams to a combined 69-20 record and to postseason Massachusetts Interscholastic Athletic Association (MIAA) tournament appearances all four years.

Even with such accomplishments, when asked by a local reporter "What do you enjoy most about basketball?" Matt responded with, "watching my team succeed on and off the court." This response summarized Matt's team-first attitude. Coach Scollan once said, "Matt's attitude is contagious to both the players and coaches throughout the program. The goal of all younger players is to be like Matt." After graduation, Matt played at Endicott College before he suffered a career-ending injury. Matt, his wife Chelsey (Class of 2011), and daughters Jayna and Anna live in Westford. He is still a big supporter of Westford Academy basketball and continues to leave a solid legacy. Matt joins his brother Zach (Class of 2002) as a most welcomed addition to the Westford Academy Athletic Hall of Fame.

MARK ERICSON CLASS OF 1986- FOOTBALL, BASKETBALL, TRACK & FIELD

To be recognized as a three-sport captain by your peers and coaches, the qualities of commitment, dedication and loyalty to team, are a given. When someone mentions Mark Ericson, being a three-sport student athlete who achieved significant success in each interscholastic activity, comes to the forefront.

Mark Ericson was a three-sport star for the Grey Ghosts during the 1984, 1985 and 1986 seasons. He led the football, basketball and spring track teams to success on and off the playing fields. His positive and contagious leadership was acknowledged by his coaches, teachers and teammates. His aggressive play and skill helped him achieve numerous team and individual awards.


During Mark's senior year, the quarterback and strong safety was named Wachusett League Most Valuable Player for Coach John Morris' Super Bowl team. Mark guided the Grey Ghosts to a share of the Wachusett League title and a victory in the Central Mass Division II Super Bowl. Offensively, Mark accounted for 1,240 yards, 635 yards passing and 605 yards rushing. He threw six touchdown passes and rushed for four touchdowns himself. As quarterback he served as the core of the offense. Defensively, Mark recorded four interceptions and 76 tackles, saving his best defensive game for the Super Bowl game versus Nashoba Regional in which he recorded nine tackles and a game saving interception. Mark was voted WA's Most Valuable Player, played in the Shriners Football All-Star.

Mark also captained the winter basketball team and the spring track team during his senior year. As a senior he was Wachusett League champion in the long and triple jumps. He also set a triple jump record of 42' 10". During his junior track season he was the league champion in the decathlon.

After high school graduation, Mark was recruited by and matriculated to Worcester Polytechnic Institute (WPI), where he started as strong safety for the Engineers. Mark was also a key member of the special teams units returning kickoffs and punts. After two years at WPI,

Mark transferred to the University of Lowell and graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Industrial Technology. He earned his Master's Degree in Technology from Mercer University.

Mark currently resides in Roswell, Georgia and has two children, Zachary and Bridget. He is self-employed as a business development consultant.



SAMANTHA HYSLIP CLASS OF 2014- SOCCER AND BASKETBALL

Sam roamed the soccer pitch as a fiercely competitive soccer goalkeeper. She was a three-year varsity soccer player, serving as captain her final season. Sam garnered DCL All-Star status her final two seasons. She was selected DCL Goalkeeper of the Year her senior year.

As excellent as Sam was for three seasons with the WAGS (Westford Academy Girls Soccer) varsity team, she was downright commanding on the basketball hardwood, as a four-year varsity player. The two-year basketball captain was a DCL All-Star for three seasons. Coach Russ Coward stated, "Sam was one of the dominant power forwards in Massachusetts during her four years at WA. More important than the team and individual accolades she earned was her leadership on and off the court."


The three-time team Most Valuable Player achieved an extremely rare accolade being named the DCL girls' basketball Most Valuable Player, not once, but twice!

Sam celebrated the winter holidays in more than one way, being named Most Valuable Player of the Christmas Bazaar Tournament, as well as the Most Valuable Player of the Commonwealth Motors Christmas Classic in 2014. Her outstanding play was recognized by the Lowell Sun, being named an All-Star three times and Player of the Year her senior year. The Boston Globe celebrated Sam's superior performance selecting her as All-Scholastic three different seasons, designating her as a Boston Globe Dream Team member her senior season. The Boston Herald joined the lengthy parade of honorees identifying Samantha as an All-Scholastic player twice, and as a member of their Dream Team her senior season. ESPN Boston chose Sam as an MIAA All-State First Team player upon



completion of her senior year. The USA Today recognized Sam with the remarkable honor of Massachusetts State First Team player. Perhaps the "crowning jewel" of Sam's numerous achievements was scoring a total of 1,295 points during her four-year career, making her only one of a select few WA female basketball players to accomplish this incredible feat!

Upon graduating from WA Sam matriculated to Stonehill College. She was a four-year women's basketball team player, captaining the team her senior season; that same year she led her team to the Division II Elite Eight berth in postseason play. Sam completed her Stonehill women's basketball career with the eighth highest rebounds total, and was the 20th highest scorer in school history!



ZACH INGALLS CLASS OF 2011- FOOTBALL AND LACROSSE

The three-year varsity football letterman dominated as a running back, slot receiver, strong safety, long snapper, punt and kickoff returner. As a junior Zach had 21 total touchdowns, 15 total kickoff and punt returns for a 35-yard average gain with three touchdowns. His 1,994 all-purpose yards were a remarkable accomplishment. Zach was the leading scorer in the DCL that football season. He was a primary reason the Grey Ghosts were crowned league champions!

His senior football season Zach achieved the following: 14 total touchdowns, 24 punt and kickoff returns for a 19 yard average with two touchdowns, as well as totaling 1,924 all-purpose yards. In a game vs. Waltham High School, the two-time football team captain returned two kickoffs of 85 and 75 yards for touchdowns, caught two touchdown passes, and threw a 36 yard touchdown pass and totaled 263 all-purpose yards. Yes, that was just one game!

Football Coach Rich McKenna spoke about Zach saying, "His drive for excellence was never ending and his attitude was contagious. Zach's hustle and positive attitude will be sorely missed in the years to come. Zach was not just a great football player, he was a great teammate and student/athlete as well."

At the conclusion of his WA football career Zach was a two-year DCL All-Star, two-year Lowell Sun All-Star, two-year Boston Globe Eastern Mass All-Star, two-year member of the Lowell Sun "The Football Team", and in 2011 was selected to play on the North squad in the Shriners All-Star Football Classic.

As a four-year varsity lacrosse stand-out, Zach played midfielder, taking the majority of face-offs. During his senior season he served as lacrosse captain, was selected team Most Valuable Player, and

was voted co-DCL Midfielder of the Year, while tallying 50 goals and 15 assists. Coach Gus Bickford stated, "When you need a goal, Zach is the guy to give the ball to. No matter which team you're playing he is one of the best athletes on the field. He has a fire in his belly that he just doesn't want to lose, and he has a rifle of a shot."

In a contest versus powerhouse Lincoln-Sudbury, Zach scored the tying goal as the clock wound down to zero in regulation time, then scored again in overtime with a sudden death goal to capture the victory.

Zach graduated from Merrimack College while excelling on the football team as a wide receiver and tight end.

ALYSSA JANN CLASS OF 2007- BASKETBALL

At 6 feet, 1 inches tall, Alyssa Jann was someone her basketball teammates always looked up to. In reality, they did so not because of her height, but because of how she acted as both a person and a player. In her four years playing varsity basketball, Alyssa was known not only for her dominance as a prolific scorer, but also for her generosity passing the ball to her teammates. One of her teammates described her as, "one of the nicest people you'll ever meet and she's an awesome player, and an awesome friend."

Described by a local sports reporter as "a scoring savant," Alyssa reached the 1,000 points milestone as a junior, and finished her WA girls' basketball career as the third all-time leading scorer with an impressive 1,503 points. She led the DCL in scoring in 2005, 2006, and 2007. Yes, that's right, three consecutive seasons! As a senior, she averaged 22 points, 8.5 rebounds, and 6 assists per game while bringing home the DCL championship to WA

Allyssa was both a team captain and the team's Most Valuable Player her junior and senior years. She also received accolades locally, regionally, and nationally. She earned DCL first team honors in 2005, 2006, and 2007; was Lowell Sun Most Valuable Player in 2006 and 2007, was named a member of the Boston Herald Super Team in 2007, and was selected to the Boston Globe All-Scholastic Team in 2006 and 2007. Additionally, Alyssa was a Street and Smith Honorable Mention All-American for 2005, 2006, 2007. In her senior year, she was recognized as a McDonald's All-American nominee and a Gatorade Massachusetts Player of the Year finalist. In recognition for her contributions to the Westford Youth Basketball Association as an organizer, referee, and coach, she was named their Person of the Year in 2007.

Off the court, Alyssa also excelled in the classroom. She was selected for the WA National Honors Society and competed at Nationals for DECA.

After graduating from WA, Alyssa went on to play basketball at Quinnipiac University, where she was a senior captain and the Female Scholar Athlete of the Year in 2011. After double-majoring there in health sciences and marketing, Dr. Jann then attended the New England College of Optometry.

Tonight Alyssa joins her brother, T.J. Jann, as vastly deserving and new inductees to the WA Athletic Hall of Fame!





TERRANCE (T.J.) JANN CLASS OF 2010- BASKETBALL AND BASEBALL

A standout two-sport athlete, T.J. achieved great success on both the basketball court and baseball field. T.J. received numerous awards and recognition in both sports; his dedication and athletic ability were recognized by his teammates, coaches, and opposing players.

In three years of varsity basketball, T.J. left WA as the second all-time leading scorer with 1,121 points. Always difficult to stop, he had two 40-point performances, while also amongst the leaders of career rebounders. T.J. was recognized as a DCL All-Star and DCL Co-Most Valuable Player. He was also selected by the Lowell Sun as both an All-Star and Player of the Year. As a senior captain, T.J. received both Boston Globe and Boston Herald All-Scholastic recognition, one of few basketball players to receive both prestigious awards. T.J. was also selected by the Massachusetts Basketball Coaches Association as one of the top players in the state. No one will forget his last high school basketball game, a 43-point, 17-rebound game against Lexington High School.

When a reporter asked WA basketball Coach Ed Scollan about T.J.'s success, his response was, "He's a terrific athlete; I mean he is an athlete. He can jump and he is agile. T.J. is definitely one of the best athletes to come out of Westford Academy."

In baseball, T.J.'s passion was obvious from second grade in the Westford Recreation League to his senior year as WA captain. His coach stated, "T.J. is a highly competitive person and brings unparalleled intensity every time he steps on the baseball field." In his senior year T.J. was 6-0 on the mound with a 0.58 ERA and 70 strikeouts, earning first team DCL All-Star status as both a pitcher and infielder. Add to this a .454 batting average, and T.J. was named as the #2 baseball prospect in New England from the Class of 2010.

Actively scouted by many colleges, T.J. continued his passion for baseball with a Division I scholarship to pitch and play infield at Penn State. A serious injury couldn't stop T.J.; he was given little chance to play again, yet came back to pitch his junior and senior year.

As a culmination of his success in baseball and basketball, T.J. was selected by the WA coaches as the 2010 Male Athlete of the Year. T.J. graduated from Penn State University (B.S. Finance) and Boston College (M.S. Finance), and is currently employed as a strategic account executive at Smartsheet.

How should Webster's Dictionary define a dominant swimmer? There is a substantial argument that it must be spelled JEN MARRKAND! Her accomplishments read like a well-defined gourmet recipe. Jen was a DCL All-Star all four years at Westford Academy. She was selected WA team Most Valuable Player each of her four seasons. Serving as a stellar team captain her senior season, she was a state champion in four events. Jen also was distinguished as the 2014 WA Female Athlete of the Year. While swimming at WA in three seasons she didn't lose a race (dual meets, league meet, sectionals and state meets). Upon graduation she was the DCL record holder in four events: medley relay, 200 individual medley, 100 butterfly, 100 backstroke. During her high school swimming career she set 14 school records



(out of a possible 16), eight individual events and six relay teams records. Jen established two individual state records as a senior in the 200 yard medley and 100 yard backstroke, while also setting a state record leading off the medley relay with her backstroke leg at the state meet. Jen exited WA with nine school swim records (out of eleven swim events). The WA Swimming record book should be renamed the "Jen Marrkand Book of Excellence"!

Her postseason accolades include: four times Lowell Sun Swimmer of the Year, four seasons Boston Globe All-Scholastic (three times Swimmer of the Year); four seasons Boston Herald All-Scholastic (four times Swimmer of the Year); three years USA Swimming All Scholastic All-American, and three years Academic All-Scholastic. Her incredible swimming achievements were instrumental in leading the WA team to Division I State Championships in three consecutive seasons. Based on her phenomenal achievements Jen also was named New England Outstanding Swimmer each of her four years, and ten times named high school All-American (top 100 swimmers in U.S.). Jen also excelled in her academic pursuits at WA being named to the National Honor Society for three years.

Once Jen completed four years of smashing many high school swimming records and excelling academically, she transitioned to the University of Virginia on a swimming scholarship, while also graduating from UVA. At UVA she was named ACC Freshman Swimmer of Year and an NCAA All-American. Jen's swimming career highlights included being a Winter & Summer Nationals Qualifier, Summer Junior Nationals Qualifier, World Trials Qualifier and 2016 Olympic Trials Qualifier in five events.

Don't think you need to have all the statistics and details about what made the respective nominee so successful. Once the Executive Board receives a nomination, it will remain active in subsequent years, therefore it eliminates the need for re-nomination. 
