





World Languages at WA



Students who did not study a language in middle school and students who wish to change the language they are studying or add a second language as an elective may choose from the following:

- French 1
- German 1
- Latin 1
- Spanish 1
- Mandarin 1*
 (Not offered at Middle Schools Open to all)

*Not all level 1 classes are offered each year so students should indicate a second choice when selecting one of these courses.

*Students with <u>significant</u> prior experience in one of these languages may qualify to start in level 2 by taking a placement test in late February



World Languages at WA

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Students who wish to <u>continue studying</u> the language they started in middle school will be recommended by their teacher for one of the following courses:

- French 2 CP or Honors
- German 2 CP or Honors
- Latin 2 CP or Honors
- Spanish 2 CP or Honors



Students should consider honors if they...

- Are curious about other cultures
- Enjoy communicating speaking, listening, reading and writing in another language
- Can learn independently and work collaboratively
- Will be an active participant in a fast paced learning environment
- Have met the prerequisite grade listed in the Program of Studies and have the recommendation of their 8th grade teacher



World Language Graduation - > Requirement

Students must take two years of the same World Language in order to satisfy the graduation requirement.

Many of our students study their language for 4 years at WA. All 5 of the languages taught have courses available for students through senior year.

Biology Level Prerequisites



Placement into courses is based on teacher recommendation.

Biology Level	Prerequisite
412 Honors	95 Overall Average in 8 th grade Science
410 CP	75 Overall Average in 8 th grade Science
406 CP	Below 75 Overall Average in 8 th grade Science

Students may override by ONE level only. For example, a student recommended for 406 CP may NOT override to the 412 Honors level.

Taking CP Biology does NOT disqualify students from AP courses later in high school (must have success in an honors level science course the year prior to enrolling in AP science).


Honors Biology Expectations



- Meets Characteristics of Successful Honors Students
- Content depth and pace is very rigorous, requiring advanced skill in scientific inquiry.
- Students are required to complete an independent scientific research project as part of their final exam.
- Students will also be required to perform a year-long, extensive study of the local ecosystem including field observations, independent investigations, and formal reports.



Specific Grade Prerequisites for Incoming Freshmen for Math and Computer Science Courses



Please note: Although a student may meet the grade prerequisite, the teacher may not recommend the requested course based upon the student's work habits.



Options for doubling up:



If you choose to double up, the options are:

- 9th Grade: 308 Algebra 1 with 321 Geometry (Not Recommended)
 - Must be requested by student, will not be automatically recommended by teacher
- 10th Grade: Geometry with Algebra 2

Strongly discouraged in 9th Grade

- Consider 10th Grade option, if at all
- Algebra 1 knowledge applied in Geometry
- Second math would take the place of a 9th Grade Elective
 - Students encouraged to explore passions and interests in other areas of WA (art, music, business, CS)

 Must earn an 80 in ECS Part A

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

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
History & Social Studies: Grade 9

Levels

- Honors
- College Prep
- Each year's grade determines eligibility for the next year



What is the difference between Levels?

All levels

- •Content: French Revolution through the Cold War
 - May change levels from one year to next, no loss of info
- Work toward understanding
 - Primary source documents
 - Secondary works

•Skills

 Research & Writing: Emphasis on skill development

Honors- Greater Independence

- Content: French Revolution through the Cold War
- Read Primary/Secondary Source Analysis...understand historical events as described by their participants or historians
- **Discuss** come to class prepared to discuss material
- Skills
 - Research & Writing: identify and use appropriate evidence to support a thesis; citations

Grade 9 Health and Physical Education-

Grade 9 Year

- Sem 1: Health and Sem 2: Basics of Kin. in P.E. or
- Sem 1: Basics of Kin. in P.E. and Sem 2: Health

 Year long engagement with curriculum content and associated benefits

Deferring Physical Education

- Grade 9 is only year this can occur
- Requires enrollment in 5 P.E. credits during one of the subsequent years
- Basics of Kin. in Physical Education is a prerequisite for enrollment in future P.E. courses
- No year long engagement with curriculum content and associated benefits

Well-Rounded Educational Experience

Exposure and engagement with the curriculum content in these courses, throughout each of the four years is vital to a student's wellness, social and emotional well-being, and success as a lifelong learner.

Physical Education is a MA General Law, WPS School Committee Policy, and Westford Academy graduation requirement.



Special Education Courses



Study Skills/Academic Support

Supports progress in IEP goals/objectives

- Provide specialized instruction
- Instruction occurs 1:1 or in small group
- Completion of class assignments/assessments

Liaison: Special education teacher who manages student IEP implementation and progress

Concepts Courses

Subject area is taught in a separate setting from the general education classroom.

- Aligned with the State Frameworks
- Curriculum is modified to meet student needs
- Taught by special educator
- Smaller class size

**Concepts courses are a Team decision

Inclusion Support at WA

Grid B: Inclusion support **IN** general education setting. Math, English, Science, History/Social Studies

- Inclusion support is a Team decision
- Student requires specialized instruction to access the general education class.
- Services provided by a teaching assistant or special education teacher.

Additional Services

Services required for students to access the curriculum are determined by the IEP Team.

- Counseling
- Speech Therapy
- Social Skills
- Occupational Therapy
- Physical Therapy
- Orientation and Mobility

Life Skills/REACH/Postgraduate

- Substantially separate programs.
- Program supports students with application of academics to real life, vocational skill development, and social skills.
- Each program is supervised by a special education teacher.

 FUNCTIONAL CUTTICULUM

MCAS

MCAS on demand test for Math, English and Science is a graduation requirement. To earn a diploma, a student must obtain a passing score in each content area.

Some students will complete an MCAS Alternative Portfolio.(Team decision)

- Alternative portfolio does not meet DESE competency determination for graduation
- Student receives a certificate of attendance.

Post-Secondary Planning (Transition)

Age 14:

- Student begins to attend their IEP meeting
- Vision statement developed
- Transition Planning Form begins to develop

Age 17:

- Age of majority notice
- 688 referral for adult funding and supports

Age 18:

 Students are considered an adult by the state and can make their own decisions, share the decision or appoint someone to make educational decisions





Scheduling Overview



The scheduling process involves three parts:

- Recommendations for course levels will be inputted into PowerSchool for students by their current teachers.
- Students review those recommendations in PowerSchool, select their required classes and choose other courses based on their interests during the open window (February 18th- March 3rd).
- Once all requests are input in PowerSchool, the master schedule will then be built based on requests.

Scheduling timeline

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- February 14th: All 8th graders visit WA!
- February 15th: Parent(s)/Caregiver(s) Curriculum Presentation
- February 18th: PowerSchool portal opens for students
- February 18th: Override Link available/open
- March 3rd: PowerSchool portal and override link closes at 2pm
- Master schedule created in May
- Schedules given to students in June


Please enter an alternate choice for each elective in the event that we are unable to schedule you for your first choice elective.


How to select your courses...




Step 1 - Review the Program of Study to read course descriptions and graduation requirements




Step 2 - Log in to Powerschool (https://westfor d.powerschool.c om/public) from February 18th-March 3rd.






Step 3 - Click on the "Class Registration" button on the left side of the screen

Step 4 - Click the Pencil Icon on the right side of the screen under each subject to see your recommendation and/or select the courses you would like to take (for courses that require a recommendation, you can *only* select the course that was recommended for you.)



To change a level up, follow the steps below for completing a request for an override but you MUST select the course that you were recommended for. If the override is approved, those will be manually entered by a

counselor.





Step 5 - Review your selections and submit your requests.



Override Process *



- Trust the recommendations that are in the system.
- Start with a conversation. Teachers make their recommendations based on departmental guidelines. This is not a subjective decision. Student should discuss the recommendation with their current teacher.
- There are limitations in place. Please follow our <u>OVERRIDE POLICY & PROCESS</u> for details of the process.
- Override google forms are due by 2pm on March 3rd.

Override Process Questions:



If my child is filling out an override form, what do they do in PowerSchool?

 Your child should mark what was recommended for them EVEN if they plan on overriding. After the portal has closed, the override note will be added to PS if it is approved.

If a student is recommended for honors, can they request CP instead? Does that require an override?

Yes, they can choose CP instead. No, that is not an override.



How will I know if my child's override was denied?

 You would receive an email from the curriculum coordinator if the request was denied.

FAQs:



- Who does my child go to if they have questions about their recommendations?
 - Students should be connecting with their teachers if they have questions regarding their recommendations.
- Who does my child go to if they have questions about scheduling?
 - Their middle school counselor with questions.
- Is there a limit to how many honors courses a student can take?
 - We do not limit the number of honors courses.
- How much homework can students anticipate nightly?
 - See <u>Time Management activity</u> for estimated time by level
